

Reflecting in the Darkness

Isaiah 9:2 The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in the land of the shadow of death, upon them a light has shined.

In this day and age being aware of the darkness in the world is as close as the big screens in our homes, the monitors on our desks, or the screens in our hands. There are those who walk in the darkness because "and men loved darkness rather than light, because their deeds were evil." (John 3:19b) Then there are those present in this world who are reflecting the light in the darkness. I was thinking of this when the sun shone through a window of my office and reflected off the face of my watch. As I moved my arm, the light moved to different places in the room where the shadows loomed. In the first chapter of the Gospel of John it tells us: "There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. This man came for a witness, to bear witness of the Light, that all through him might believe. He was not that Light, but was sent to bear witness of that Light. To bear witness to, to reflect that light to the world." In Matthew 5 Jesus tells us: "You are the light of the world; Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven."

As I mentioned, there is much darkness in the world. The Bible states the light should be witnessed to. Jesus tells us that we are the light of the world and to let our light shine. It's scary because light stands out in the darkness; light draws attention. It seems safer, more comfortable to go unnoticed. To drift through life without the attention being a light can bring. It is interesting though how drawing attention and being noticed for worldly ways is acceptable and is more comfortable for some.

I have found that it is easier than I thought to reflect the light of the Lord into the world, to 'brighten someone's day'. To not try to create or look for grand opportunities, but rather to take every small and seemingly insignificant opportunity to do so. When this is done often enough, the world becomes a brighter place. When Jesus was born in a manger, a great light entered the world. He drew people to Him and as Jesus grew and stepped out

into the world, He continued to draw people from near and far. Those who came, those who are hungry, those who labor, those who are heavy laden, they came and they received what they needed. They, like all of us, need the light, for light gives comfort, it gives security, it gives rest and peace from the fear that the darkness creates.

Once again we have celebrated the entry of the light into the world and then the resurrection of that light from the darkness of the tomb of death. Now let us celebrate as that light has been entrusted to us to share to the entire world. No fear, no doubt, no uncertainty-- just the pure joy of reflecting God's love, God's light into the dark and desperate corners of the world. Whether we are noticed or not, it is the light we reflect that will bring peace and comfort to all who receive it. For we are not the light, we are to bear witness to the light; we are to reflect the light so that it glorifies our God and our Savior Jesus Christ.

No matter how we became aware of the darkness in this world, let us not just reflect on it. Instead let us reflect the light of Jesus Christ in it because darkness cannot overcome the light. Thanks be to God.
