

Vision for the New Year

Here we are... a new year, a new decade, a new opportunity. This is the year 2020. It is more than just a number. When written 20/20 it speaks of having normal vision, being able to see clearly what is considered normal visual acuity as compared to others. A common practice over recent decades has been to compose a mission and/or vision statement, something to help keep people focused on their goals, their purpose, and the path ahead. Be thou my vision, O Lord of my heart; naught be all else to me, save that thou art - thou my best thought, by day or by night; waking or sleeping, thy presence my light.

Be thou my wisdom, and thou my true word; I ever with thee and thou with me, Lord. Thou my great Father; thine own may I be, thou in me dwelling and I one with thee.

Riches I heed not, nor vain, empty praise; thou mine inheritance, now and always; thou and thou only first in my heart, high King of heaven, my treasure thou art.

High King of heaven, my victory won, may I reach heaven's joys, O bright heaven's sun! Heart of my own heart, whatever befall, still be my vision, O Ruler of all.

Putting Jesus first in our lives really isn't that hard; we just have to ask. Use these words by Robert Cull: Open our eyes, Lord, we want to see Jesus, to reach out and touch him, and say that we love him. Open our ears, Lord, and help us to listen. Open our eyes, Lord, we want to see Jesus.

May 2020 bring you renewed hope, joy, peace, and faith. Begin each day by looking up for God to show you the way.
