The Most Wonderful Time of the Year

What time is it? It's Christmas time, which is sung about as the most wonderful time of the year. What makes it so wonderful? The song tells us that "it's kids jingle bell'ing, and everyone telling you 'Be of good cheer!' with holiday greetings when friends come to call. Parties for hosting, marshmallows for toasting, caroling out in the snow and tales of the glories of Christmas's long, long, ago. There'll be much mistletoe'ing and hearts will be glowing when loved ones are near. Yes, the most wonderful time of the year." All of those pieces help make it a very festive time and have created many a fond memory. This year some of those pieces will be more difficult to include in our celebrations. Will it still seem like the most wonderful time of the year for us? In yet another seasonal favorite, "It's Beginning to Look a Lot Like Christmas", the song describes decorations glistening and toys in every store. The hopes and wishes of boys and girls are for the gifts that will be under the tree and for their moms and dads, it will be for school to start again.

For those who celebrate Christmas and other holiday festivities during this year, it will be very different. The typical gatherings that help make it one of the most wonderful times of the year will be restricted or prohibited. With less parties and feasting and holiday greetings, it may be hard to "be of good cheer". Still it is the holiday music that helps me achieve the hope and joy that makes this time of year wonderful. One of the musical pieces that helps for me is *Christmas Eve/Sarajevo 12/24* by Trans-Siberian Orchestra. It is reportedly based on the stories of musicians who played in the streets and bombed out buildings of war torn Sarajevo during the Bosnian war in the early 90's. One musician the instrumental piece focuses on is a famous cellist who returns home to Sarajevo to find it in ruins due to the conflict between the people of his own country. Some labeled him as foolish, for rather than go to a bomb shelter, this man sat on the rubble piles in the village square with his cello and played Mozart, Beethoven, and forgotten Christmas carols such as "God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen" and "Carol of the Bells". When asked why, he replied that he played to both sides of the conflict amid the rubble and devastation of the city he loves. That it was his way of proving that despite all evidence to the contrary, the spirit of humanity was still alive in that place.

The musical piece that leads us into Advent and up to our Christmas Eve is "O come, O come, Emmanuel". In its verses it describes being held captive, mourning in lonely exile, Satan's tyranny, the gloomy clouds of night, and the path to misery. Its theme, our plea, is for Emmanuel - God with us - to come, to appear, to ransom us from the depths of this hell, the grave, and death's dark shadow, to make safe the way that leads on high and open wide our heavenly home. Yes, "it's beginning to look a lot like Christmas; soon the bells will start, and the thing that will make them ring is the carol that you sing right within your heart!"

Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, o Israel.

I can assure you that this is the most wonderful time of the year. No matter how the events of the current world affect our lives this Christmas, the greatest event in the world is still true. <u>Then the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid, for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy which will be to all people. For there is born to you this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. May the songs in our heart herald this true reason for the season, and may we proclaim: <u>"Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, goodwill toward men!"</u></u>

Our Phoebes have been busy working at both the church and at their homes designing, sewing, blindsiding and knotting many quilts. The results:


- September and October a total of 25 quilts were delivered to Schenectady City Mission.




