Offense or Defense

One of the online resources I use is called Faithit. This past month one of the stories posted was about a high school football team and their coach. In many competitions there are two sides...Offense and Defense. Defense is defined as the act or action of defending; capability of resisting attack; a means or method of protecting oneself. Offense is defined as something that outrages the moral or physical senses; the act of displeasing or affronting; a breach of a moral or social code; the act of attacking; the means or method of attacking or attempting to score; scoring ability. Throughout our lives, not just in athletics, we are in competition and I wonder if the dual meaning of offense is used more against people rather than for people.

It can all get rather confusing at times. In a land that protects and defends our freedoms, there is an on going competition regarding the practice of freedom of religion. The competition on and off the field regarding the afore mentioned coach and team is stated to have begun with a ban requested by the 'Freedom From Religion Foundation'. The ban came about when it was noted that the coach prayed with the team members, on the field before their games. It was not made clear if the coach was leading or just participating in the prayer time. A news reporter gave the impression the ban did not allow the coach to participate, even in a student led prayer. It was stated that the coach is a 'public' school employee and his actions are seen as him 'furthering personal religious beliefs' and 'equate to a government advancement and endorsement of religion'. The petitioner (FFRF) believes this is a 'violation of the Establishment Clause of the First Amendment' of the Constitution of the United States.

It is written that there is a competition, a war going on over souls. Paul wrote in Philippians 3:14 I press toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus. In competition one is on offense when they are advancing/moving towards the goal. An important objective for all people is not to be 'offensive' for in doing so one can be penalized. I've pondered if the public display of the symbols, words, and actions of our faith are being labeled as offensive in order to penalize and restrict those who practice them. Our national freedoms protect many symbols, words, and actions that are found to be offensive to some. I feel they are a statement about those who use them, a furthering of beliefs that they feel are acceptable and permissible. I wonder if the symbols, words, and actions of the faithful to God are treated differently than those of other beliefs, thus causing the faithful to take the field in defense mode?

Ephesians 6:12 For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this age, against spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places. I have not heard about bans or actions taken against all of the symbols, words, and actions that are present in our society. Disapproval is voiced against many, but it seems that more often than not actions are taken against those that represent faith and belief in God.

Jesus did not appear to be on defense while here on earth. He strove towards the goal. He spoke "the kingdom of heaven is like" and "blessed are those who". He gave people what they needed to make an informed choice. A decision that effects each and every person for eternity. He was on the offense to score souls for the kingdom without being offensive. Yet, we know that what He said and did was offensive to some and it led to His crucifixion. Let us learn from Jesus. Let us remember that in our journey here on earth we may well have to play defense sometimes. Do not be afraid to be on offense, striving towards the goal. Just don't be offensive in doing so. Oh, when the coach was banned from praying with the team, 400 students stood together before their next game and bowed their heads in prayer. It is not illegal for students to do so and they rose up as leaders. Leaders on their field, in their community, and of the faith. Thanks be to God.


