

Independence, Freedom, and God

July is the month of vacations, summer fun, trips on the open road and exercising our personal freedom. After all...it is the month to celebrate and remember our freedom, our Independence Day. Let's take a closer look at freedom and independence and see how it is perceived today.

There are multiple generations today that have not experienced nor know anything other than the freedom and independence we currently enjoy. It seems that in this land of the free there are many who do not feel that way. Kris Kristofferson penned the lyrics "freedom's just another word for nothin' left to lose". It is on the roller coaster of life when we find ourselves trying to climb up another hill after a rapid decline that we will discover the truth, 'It is when God is all you have left that you realize God is all that you need'.

Jesus said, "If you abide in My word, you are My disciples indeed. And you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." A related quote from Jesus is, 'And a slave does not abide in the house forever, but a son abides forever. Therefore, if the Son makes you free, you shall be free indeed'. As we examine our perception of freedom, let us look at the truth in Jesus' words.

What holds us captive; what are we a slave to? What is it we need to lose so we can see God's presence more clearly, so we can hear God's directions more understandably? As a nation we celebrate independence, which means freedom from the rule or control of another. Through many dangers, toils, and snares we have already come, and strive to remain united in our declarations, our proclamations, our communities. Has this mind set gone beyond the physical terrain? Has it infiltrated the spiritual domain as well? In God's exchange with Job He queries him, 'Where were you when I laid the foundations of the earth? Tell Me, if you have understanding.' God has given us the freedom of will to choose the paths we take. We have been able through that freedom and independence to technologically advance to where we believe we have a greater understanding of how things really are...or do we? While we enjoy our personal and our united independence, we must remember the words the founding fathers chose to reveal our dependence on the one who is omnipresent, omniscient, and omnipotent - the truth and the blessings in these words, 'one nation under God' and 'in God we trust'.

The Apostle Paul frequently referred to himself as 'a prisoner of Jesus Christ'. This surrender is only accomplished by the freedom and independence both he and we have. The freedom of will to choose that status - a prisoner of Jesus Christ, to put 'God first', to be a servant to Jesus Christ the Lord of Lords and King of Kings, to surrender all to His will. In 2nd Chronicles God said, 'if My people who are called by My name will humble themselves, and pray and seek My face, and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin and heal their land'. True freedom only comes with our dependence on the One who was the first to offer it to us. Let us celebrate that Jesus said, 'I am the way, the truth, and the life', and when you accept the truth, the truth will set you free and you shall be free indeed.
