### The Best Guide for the Journey

In this life each person has a source of inspiration, a force that gives us motivation, drive, direction. As I reflect on events both current and historical, as well as the history of my own personal journey, I ponder what it is that has guided us. The scriptures tell us in 2 Corinthians 5:7 For we walk by faith, not by sight.

This has led me to a very important question. Do I try to justify how I walk by my faith or do I justify my faith by how I walk? The structure of these questions says a lot. In the first one the walk comes before faith and so one might "try" to justify how they walk by supportive scripture verses. Sometimes that is managed by rewriting or reinterpreting what has already been written in an attempt to defend one's decision or course. When questioned about their path or the direction, one response might be "yes, but...". The second question puts faith first and then the walk. If we think on this too long, it can easily become confusing. I formed these questions based on the definitions of justify.

Justify - to show or prove to be right or reasonable, to give a reason or defense for. Justify (theological) - to declare or make righteous in the sight of God.

On our journeys, do we try to defend our walk, our actions, our words to lessen any harm they cause or any guilt we may feel afterward? Are we guided by those famous words of old, "go ahead; what's the harm?" When we walk by sight, we may see things as "well it's the norm; it goes on all the time." The opposite would be that sometimes we may view things as overwhelming or impossible and respond, "I don't know how or why this was given to me, but you have the wrong person, Lord, for I am not able; I don't have what it takes." If you look in the scriptures, you will find several people who responded in both of these ways. The first found difficulties as they turned from the Lord; the second found it best to step out in faith and learn to trust the Lord.

When we walk by faith, it is putting the Lord first. It is by spending time learning God's will for us and how to walk and how to live as it is spelled out in the scriptures. To start each journey, each task, each day, looking to the Lord in prayer. When we walk by faith, we are trusting in the Lord and the commandments that were given to us long ago. Jesus summed up the commandments in these words from Matthew 22:37 Jesus said to him, "'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

We are again at the threshold of Lent -- a journey and a walk that ended in the greatest sacrifice ever made. It was a sacrifice made on our behalf, for our benefit and for our eternal salvation. We may never be asked to make the same kind of sacrifice that was made for us. We may never fully comprehend or appreciate it either. But we may look at our walk, our journey, and ask ourselves...do I try to justify my walk by my interpretation of faith or do I justify my faith by how I walk? May our journeys, our walks, be seen and declared as righteous in the sight of those watching and especially by God, who teaches us all we need to know about how to walk this journey. AMEN.



Our 2018 year at St. Mark's was one filled with accomplishments. We worked on the most effective way to meet our mission goals of Church Growth and Calling for a Spiritual Leader and Unity.

Together we completed the Roof Replacement Project and the Driveway Project. We were awarded a Grant of \$9,000.00 from Oldham Little Church Foundation for the Roof Replacement. We received this check in January 2019. We were able to raise the full amount of \$30,000.00 for the Driveway Project and the new driveway was completed in July 2018.

We had a special Congregational Meeting in July, where the Call Committee made the recommendation of Pastor Dave Houck to be the Pastor of St Mark's. A vote was held, and it was unanimous. The Lord has serenely blessed St. Mark's with a very special spiritual leader.

We had a dedication service in September of the new engraved stone front sign that was donated by the Zinsman family in loving memory of Pastor Zinsman.

2019 is here our and the Phoebe's have been very busy this past year. In our ministry of reaching out to others with encouragement baskets and quilts we are so blessed in our endeavor to bless others. As I have stated many times in the past, we are so blessed with the donations and support of others. Sometimes we are overwhelmed with the chaos and mess in the Phoebe room. God is so good and blesses us so that we can bless others.

Our outreach activities in 2018 included:

48 encouragement baskets were made and delivered. We thank Janet Abrams and Gloria Falcone for assuming the filling of the baskets for this purpose.

119 adult and children quilts were distributed to Schenectady City Mission, Marathon for A Better Life, Baptist health in Scotia, River Ridge Nursing Home in Amsterdam, Albany Medical Children's Unit, Bassett Hospital in Cooperstown, MEVAC for their 50 Year Celebration, Middleburgh library, The Veteran's Administration Hospital in Albany, Camp Erin at Speculator, New York.

53 quilts were given to individuals far and near.

14 fidget blankets were made and taken to NYRA house on Maple Avenue in the village and the Albany County Nursing Home.

The Phoebe's held our annual pie sale and as usual this was a great success. Thank you goes to all the people who make pies for this event. We also held a pork roast dinner fundraiser and our crafts are on sale at several events. We also participated in Miracle on Main Street offering free hot chocolate and brownies and our crafts were on sale. It was a very cold evening and we were blessed with many people coming in to get warm. With the fundraisers we were able to give \$725.00 to the Driveway Fund, \$100.00 to MEVAC and \$34.35 to the Schenectady City Mission for Thanksgiving dinners.

We hosted a reception for the Thorpe family after their memorial service. With Carolyn Wyckoff's help we also hosted a fundraising brunch for the Conesville Seniors. This was a good time for all.

We still have a time of devotion at our lunch and we all take turns participating in these readings and discussions. This is a time that the Phoebes look forward to. A quiet time in our busy lives is always a blessing.

We have grown nicely this past year and have a few people not from our own congregation which is wonderful. Please feel free to stop in and visit or join us any Monday between 9:30am and 2pm. We will find something for you to do.

### Food Pantry

Donations were received from school and community clubs, local churches, Boy Scouts, U.S. Post Office, Hannaford Food Market, Valley Market, and other community friends. As always, our congregation has been generous with non-perishable and monetary donations.

We were blessed with an \$800 grant from the <u>Hunger Prevention Nutrition Assistance Program again this year</u>. Every quarter, \$200 is applied to our account at the Regional Food Bank in Latham. Assistance from these sources and others made it possible to offer nutritious foods and maintain our pantry's supplies. Many thanks are extended to Dennis Foland, Dennis France, Tom Nesbitt and Virgil Cater for their commitment to pick up the food each month.

The holidays are a very special time of year and in 2018 we were able to give away three (3) Thanksgiving baskets through our pantry. The congregation also collected food items for the Joshua Project Thanksgiving baskets so that food could be provided for many local families in need.

Even pets were provided for as dog food was made available through the "Jazzy's Place" grant. Five families received pet food.

### Clothing Closet

Donations made it possible to fulfill the need for clothing, shoes, boots, bedding and small household items. We met some specific needs for customers of the Everything Shoppe and clients of the <u>Department of Social Services</u> and donated clothing to the <u>Schenectady City Mission</u>.

### **Domestics**

Seven (7) families received bedding and small household items (mostly kitchen ware).

Socks, mittens, hats and scarves were given to Schenectady City Mission and the Joshua Project.

### "Coats for Kids" and Adults

Working with the Joshua Project, St. Mark's hosted a coat, snowpants, boots, hats, mittens and scarf give-away. Thank you to the people who helped.

### Summer Band Concert Ice Cream Social

A variety of delicious desserts and ice cream were enjoyed by those attending the concert on the MCS high school lawn. Stewart's donated the ice cream and sundae fixings. People really enjoyed our pies and brownie sundaes. Proceeds benefited our food pantry account. Thank you bakers, you make it possible!

### **Christmas Appeal**

17 Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes were packed with love and delivered to our Samaritan's Purse Relay Center. In addition, Walmart gift cards were sent to Wings as Eagles Ministries to bless the Native American children with gifts. Imagine the joy on the faces of the children who receive Jesus' love through these ministries!

### **ANNUAL PROPERTY 2018**

This past calendar year saw a number of completed projects as well as needed repairs or improvements. The most obvious and also the most expensive was the completion of the paving of the parking lot. The success of this project was due in part to the efforts of Richard Whittaker who provided technical knowledge that ensured compliance with code and zoning laws.

Additionally, the lights that were out for a number of months this past year in the back parking lot were fixed. This repair adds to both safety and convenience.

An insurance company inspection revealed some discrepencies that needed immediate attention. Two sets of stairs were without hand rails and needed to be remedied. These were the stairs leading up to the attic and the stairs leading down to the basement. Both sets of stairs were fixed by a church member who volunteered both time and material. There were also some electrical problems in the basement that were in need of repair. These discrepencies were remedied by a licensed electrician.

An on-demand hot water heater was installed that, over time, will save money and will greatly add to the convenience of those that use the facilities.

During November, the first snowfall with its associated freezing temperatures caused an ice accumulation on the north side gutters of the Fellowship Hall resulting in the gutters pulling away from the building. This is normally an easy repair but due to the height involved it would have been a potentially dangerous fix. This problem was remedied by hiring a bucket truck. A new and beautiful Saint Mark's Lutheran Church sign now graces our front lawn. This sign was generously donated by Rev. Zinsman family.


