"God, be merciful to me, a sinner!"

In the gospel of Luke 18:9-14 we read, "He also told this parable to some who trusted in themselves that they were righteous, and treated others with contempt: "Two men went up into the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee, standing by himself, prayed thus: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other men, extortioners, unjust, adulterers, or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week; I give tithes of all that I get.' But the tax collector, standing far off, would not even lift up his eyes to heaven, but beat his breast, saying, 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner!'

This is a familiar text, one in which we will do well to reflect on especially as we are approaching the season of Lent. It's all too easy for many of us to be filled with self righteousness and judgment much like the Pharisee in scripture. Many times as this story is preached in church we are quick to condemn the Pharisee as we should, because of his lack of humility and love for others.

His approach to prayer and his prayer as a whole was far from what prayer truly is. We are invited to go to God in prayer and humble ourselves so that we can be lifted up and receive God's forgiveness. We cannot be a Christian if we refuse to communicate with God, and examine ourselves. All of us as God's elect are under attack by the devil we cannot defeat him by our own strength, but by the power of the blood of Jesus. I would argue that we have all been guilty of being like the Pharisee at one time or another boasting about all that we do for God and condemning those that don't do as much as we do.

It's easy for us to stand up proudly and say, "I go to church every Sunday," "I give generously to the poor," "I read the Bible everyday and I fast every week." But in the same breath we can call up our friends and condemn all those we think are falling short, so we can feel better about ourselves. We can be in church every Sunday, give generously to the poor, read the Bible and fast but if we do not allow the word of God to bear fruits and the Holy Spirit to transform us then we are still living in sin.

The tax collector did not pretend to be perfect, he was aware that he was a sinful man, and as a result he will not even look up to heaven but beat his breast saying, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner." Two men came in to pray but only one prayed and one received forgiveness. The other was present in the temple and thought that he prayed but he did not pray to God but to himself. When we go to church and our mind is not on worship but on something else then we are in danger of being like the Pharisee in the story. When we go to church knowing that we are sinful and need forgiveness then God will forgive us because he is merciful. As we prepare for Lent, let us allow ourselves to be transformed by the Holy Spirit. Let us pray like the tax collector asking God to have mercy, let us ask the Lord like the psalmist to search us and know our hearts and see if there be any wicked way in us and if there is to cleanse us and make us whole. Remember 1 John 7-8 says "If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. Amen.

Then in September we moved back to the church fellowship hall with 19 youth. Since then and for various reasons, several children had to leave us so now we have 16 participating in ASP.

Even though we are on a smaller scale, it is still very rewarding and at times challenging. Our staff this year consists of Patti Bowman, Jessica Miller, Melissa Sniffen, Sharon Nesbitt and Cheryl Cater working full time. Maureen Sniffen has been added to our staff and is a great asset in the homework room, especially with the new "core" math challenge this year. Bonnie Morton, helps volunteer one day a week and Carolyn Wyckoff is always willing to substitute when needed. Thanks goes to a great team and to God for selecting them!

We meet from 3:00 until 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Our daily schedule includes taking attendance, reading a Bible story which is followed by a prayer given by one of the youths and then snack time. After that, we focus on homework time and play time.

In the fall of 2013 we applied for a grant to create a fenced in playground area behind the church. However, we do not expect to receive a reply for our request until later this year.

Our outreach activities in 2013 include:

- 24 encouragement baskets were made and delivered
- Hats and mittens from our mitten tree were given to our After School Program, Wings as Eagles
 Ministry, Middleburgh Elementary School, Schoharie Central School, Gilboa-Conesville Central
 School, Office of the Aging and Catholic Charities
- 48 quilts delivered to City Mission, Wings as Eagles Ministries, victims of floods in Colorado, Albany Medical Center and the VA Hospital
- 12 quilts were given out locally
- 10 doll quilts which was a new outreach for the Phoebe's this year
- 1 queen size quilt was donated to Creative Women's Ministry to be auctioned as a fundraiser
- 1 quilt given as a door prize at our church chicken and biscuit dinner in September (won by David Coons)

The Phoebe's held several fundraisers and we say a thank you to all who supported our efforts. Delicious strawberry jam and (pepper jelly -thank you Ron and Edna) were made and sold during the summer to help defray the cost of supplies for our quilts. Our annual pie sale was again a great success. A paint pail was made to collect donations for the cost of the paint for the sanctuary and it was so successful that the left over funds were given to us toward our next fundraiser which is to buy fabric and cover the pew cushions. We also sold handmade scarves for this purpose.

Table decorations for our chicken parm dinner in August and for the chicken 'n biscuit dinner in September were made and were a great conversation piece.

We also hosted receptions for Lorene Duncan's and Harold Peterson's memorial services.

One of the highlights of our Monday lunch time is our Bible study. This has been a great time of learning and discussion. We are now doing 100 Women of the Bible and this has been very educational. A big "thank you" goes to Carolyn Wyckoff who leads this devotion time.

Our mission is and always has been to be the hands and feet of Jesus in the world. God is so good all the time and He has richly blessed us in all of our endeavors to bless others.
