
Council Members:

Church

The word church is both identifying and descriptive. When capitalized, Church, it is considered to be referring to the body of all believers. Whereas church is relating to the building that Christians, the Church, gather in to worship.

Since it's origin when the followers of Jesus Christ began to form communities they have been considered the Church and worshiped in churches. First in homes, which were known as house churches and are still in practice to this day. It is believed that the first identified church building was in the 3rd century, with a major increase in the number of buildings between the 11th and 14th centuries.

In 2010 the world population was estimated to be 6.9 billion people. That same year research estimates 5.8 billion people have a religious affiliation. Recently as I was going through some of my files I came across an old newspaper article that I thought was worth sharing. I do not have the date or the name of periodical that it was published in, yet find it very relevant.

Why Go To Church?

A Church goer wrote a letter to the editor of a newspaper and complained that it made no sense to go to church every Sunday.

"I've gone for 30 years now," he wrote, "and in that time I have heard something like 3,000 sermons. But for the life of me, I can't remember a single one of them. So, I think I'm wasting my time and the pastors are wasting theirs by giving sermons at all."

This started a real controversy in the "Letters to the Editor" column, much to the delight of the editor. It went on for weeks until someone wrote this clincher:

"I've been married for 30 years now. In that time my wife has cooked some 32,000 meals. But, for the life of me, I cannot recall the entire menu for a single one of those meals. But I do know this... They all nourished me and gave me the strength I needed to do my work. If my wife had not given me these meals, I would be physically dead today. Likewise, if I had not gone to church for nourishment, I would be spiritually dead today!" When you are DOWN to nothing.... God is UP to something! Faith sees the invisible, believes the incredible and receives the impossible!

The Kingsmen recorded a song titled "Excuses". The first line goes-Excuses, excuses, you'll hear them every day. And the Devil he'll supply them, if the church you stay away. Each line of the song provides a variety of excuses, some of which even sound humorous. It is disheartening to wonder if any of them could be true. Humanity was created in the image of God, but that does not make us God, as the first temptation and fall proved. We are not, and can not be, omnipotent, omniscient, or omnipresent. We are a work in progress, growing and developing physically, mentally, emotionally and spiritually. Of all of the places we go for nourishment in each of these areas the church is the one that offers the most for the best price (it only costs time) and is utilized the least. This month as we give thanks for the nourishment we receive from our tables, let us strive to get the nourishment we need most, and invite others to come to church for theirs as well. Thank God for our physical AND our spiritual nourishment!

News from Plymouth

By the time you read this we likely will have had our first frost. The leaves will be in full color. The cranberries will have been harvested. The Atlantic Mission District Convocation will be done and over with and Thanksgiving will be around the corner. My hope is that these notes might encourage you as you struggle to become the church that Christ is calling you to become in these very different, difficult times.


I joined a dozen members of Christ Lutheran Church for a guided tour of the National Monument to the Forefathers. Colleen and I had happened upon this 81 foot tall monument by accident a couple of years ago and found it impressive in size and detail, but the guide told the stories around the monuments conception and creation. As the guide pointed out the symbolism of the monument and connected the meaning to the history of the Pilgrims, I began to see it not just as an enormous pile of granite, but as a story ready to be appreciated by everyone who visits.

Besides the names of the passengers on the Mayflower (half of whom died in the winter months after disembarking at Plymouth) there are two notable inscriptions on the monument. One is from those who erected the monument: "National Monument to the Forefathers erected by a grateful people in remembrance of their labors, sacrifices, and sufferings for the cause of civil and religious liberty." The other is from Governor William Bradford: "Thus out of small beginnings greater things have been produced by his hand that made all things of nothing and gives being to all things that are. . .and as one small candle may light a thousand, so the light here kindled hath shone unto many, year in some sort to our whole nation. Let the glorious name of Jehovah have all the praise."

The visit to the monument was organized by a member of Christ Lutheran Church. It was one small step in the direction of a different way of being church. A comfort dog ministry to lonely, grieving, hurting members of the community is another small but consequential step toward being church in the midst of 21st century social realities. Laity being mentored to lead worship and visit with the guidance of a part-time pastor is yet another different and even scary step in the direction God seems to be calling them to be His church now.

The Pilgrims survived because of their faith in Christ and their determination to adapt to their surroundings, bequeathing on us "civil and religious liberty." I believe we - the people of Christ Lutheran Church and the people of St. Mark's Lutheran Church - will also survive because of our faith in Christ and our determination to adapt to our surroundings for His glory, so that "our one small candle may light a thousand.
