Operation Christmas Child

Time passes so quickly and it is difficult to believe that Operation Christmas Child collection week is only about three and a half months away. If you have not already done so, now is the time to purchase school supplies for the shoeboxes you will pack. Providing a few basic items such as paper, pencils, a pencil sharpener, and crayons may give a child what he or she needs to attend classes. Please remember to include hygiene items such as a bar of soap, washcloth, comb, and toothbrushes as well as clothing items and small toys such as a ball, stuffed animal, jump rope, doll, cars, etc. Toys are something that many parents are unable to afford, and what child doesn't like to play with toys?

Labor

This month starts off with the Labor Day Holiday. Labor Day 2019 is the 125th anniversary of Labor Day being celebrated as a national holiday. Labor Day, the first Monday in September, is a creation of the labor movement and is dedicated to the social and economic achievements of American workers. It constitutes a yearly national tribute to the contributions workers have made to the strength, prosperity, and well-being of our country. It is celebrated by many with parades, bar-b-ques, and a last fling of summer so to speak as it has been dubbed the unofficial end of summer.

Labor is defined as the expenditure of physical or mental effort especially when difficult or compulsory; work, especially hard physical work. That may be the reason why the term is used to describe the birthing process. Whether it is a worker earning a wage or a mother bringing new life into the world, labor at one point or another involves pain. Is the pain factor why we choose to create ways and means to remove it from the process? Could that be part of the reason why we have an epidemic in our world today to chemically escape pain or at least the reality of it and life?

What do we labor for in this life? With all that is striving for our attention, our time, our desire, our labor....what is it we truly want? When all is said and done where, and with what, do we want to end up? Ah, heaven, isn't that goal of this race we are running? By the Grace of God through Jesus Christ, who is the author and finisher of our faith, we have been given the opportunity to receive the gift of salvation that was bought by His blood. The scriptures tell us in Romans 8:6 The Spirit Himself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God, ¹⁷ and if children, then heirs—heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ, if indeed we **suffer** with Him, that we may also be glorified together. ¹⁸ For I consider that the **sufferings** of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory which shall be revealed in us.

James M. Black penned these words back in 1893 (which by the way was one year before the U.S. Congress passed an act making the first Monday in September a legal holiday-Labor Day),

Let us labor for the Master from the dawn till setting sun, Let us talk of all His wondrous love and care; Then when all of life is over, and our work on earth is done, And the roll is called up yonder, I'll be there.

As we continue our race to the finish line and as we count up the holidays that we enjoy so much, let us reflect on who and what we are laboring for. We are saved and live by faith, but we labor for love...and God is love. May we not just long for our holidays, let us make everyday a Holy Day. Let us labor for the Lord; let us labor for love.


